Update on Jon-Luke Lancon from His Family

Jon-Luke just finished the last part of the consolidation phase of his treatment plan. He has undergone six rounds of chemotherapy, resection surgery, two bone marrow transplants, and twelve radiation



treatments. Next week, he will have an evaluation of his response to therapy. Our hope is that he is declared NED (*No evidence of disease*). From there, he will go into the maintenance phase of treatment where he will receive six rounds of an antibody every three weeks. This antibody will not only destroy microscopic cancer cells, but it also teaches the immune system to attack them as well. We are hoping to come "home home" during our two weeks off of antibody therapy.

Jon-Luke is thriving and acting like a normal, rough and tumble three-year-old boy!

Statement of Bishop Douglas Deshotel on Pope Francis' Recent Comments on Civil Unions

Media reports have been surfacing following the release of a documentary film, *Francesco*, in which the Holy Father seemingly offered an opinion supporting civil rights of those persons in same sex civil unions.

Such an opinion offered within the context of a movie, even if offered by the successor of Saint Peter, can in no way be considered official magisterial teaching. While we wait for an official transcript of the Pope's remarks, which can be taken out of context, I wish to reassure the faithful that the Holy Father's statement does not change any doctrines of the Church which are drawn from Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition.

All human beings are created in the image and likeness of God and are deserving of dignity and respect. Marriage is a sacrament instituted by Jesus Christ in which one man and one woman are united in an indissoluble bond open to the procreation and education of children. All Christians are called to chastity according to their station in life. Sexual activity outside of the marriage between one man and one woman is gravely immoral.

A summary of the official Church teaching on the issue of same sex attraction and homosexual acts can be found in the **Catechism of the Catholic Church** paragraphs 2357-2359.

Statement Regarding Homosexual Civil Unions Bishop Glen Provost, D.D. Diocese of Lake Charles

The media has reported remarks by Pope Francis emanating from a documentary premiered today in Rome. In this documentary, the news source reports that the Pope supported laws to protect civil unions between individuals of the same sex.

If this report is correct, then a clarification is needed. In 2003 the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, headed by Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger [Pope Benedict XVI], with the explicit approval of Pope Saint John Paul II, reiterated the Church's authentic teaching that "respect for homosexual persons cannot lead in any way to approval of homosexual behavior or to legal recognition of homosexual unions ... Legal recognition of homosexual unions or placing them on the same level as marriage would mean not only the approval of deviant behavior, with the consequence of making it a model in present-day society, but would also obscure basic values which belong to the common inheritance of humanity" (Considerations Regarding Proposals to Give Legal Recognition to Unions between Homosexual Persons, CDF, March 28, 2003, no. 11). Pope Francis reiterates this same teaching and quotes the document from the CDF in his Apostolic Exhortation, Amoris Laetitia (251).

The constant teaching of the Catholic Church opposing the legalization of same-sex unions remains unchanged. Authentic teaching is summarized in the **Catechism** and in other papal pronouncements based upon Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition, not in media interviews or documentary films.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

In a short time, we will all have the opportunity to elect new leaders for our nation, state and local communities. The right to vote is a cherished right,

won by the sacrifices of many men and women who OFFICE OF THE BISHOP have served our country in the past and the founders who established our Constitution.

As citizens of the United States, we have a duty to vote, a moral obligation to improve the community in which we live and to elect good leaders who make good and just laws that protect the rights and freedoms of all. Saint Paul even told the early Christians to be good citizens of the Roman Empire and to give good example by their lives.

The Catholic Church does not endorse any candidate or political party. Each Catholic should inform themselves of the positions held by various candidates and vote for those who most closely reflect the values and moral teaching that we as Catholics believe build a good and just society. There can be differences of opinion about how that is best achieved.

For us as Catholics and for all people of good will, the following are beliefs that are non-negotiable:

- The sacredness of and the reverence due to every human person regardless of race, color or creed from conception in the womb until natural death because the human person is created in the image and likeness of God.
- The right to life of every child in the womb.
- The sacredness of the family as the basic building block of society.
- The definition of Christian marriage as the permanent union of one man and one woman open to new life.
- The right of every human person to decent housing and employment at a just wage.
- The just and fair treatment of immigrants who come to our country to seek a better life for themselves and their families.

These are values which we believe improve our society and preserve our civilization. I pray that each Catholic in the Diocese of Lafayette will take their duty to vote seriously and exercise that duty. May the Holy Spirit guide us all as we seek the Will of God and build a just society for all citizens of the United States.

Where Francis Leads, We Can't Follow by Michael Warren Davis

"Homosexuals have a right to be a part of the family. They're children of God and have a right to a family. Nobody should be thrown out or be made miserable because of it. What we have to create is a civil union law. That way they are legally covered. I stood up for that."

That's a quote from Pope Francis. Pope Francis — the Bishop of Rome, the Vicar of Christ, the Supreme Pontiff of the Catholic Church. And not only has he come out in support of civil unions for same-sex couples: he has also confirmed old rumors that he did so in his native Argentina as early as 2010. For at least a decade, Francis has quietly but actively dissented from Church teaching on human sexuality.

Lest there be any doubt, in 2003 the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith — then led by Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger (Pope Benedict XVI), who was appointed by John Paul II — declared:

The Church teaches that respect for homosexual persons cannot lead in any way to approval of homosexual behavior or to legal recognition of homosexual unions ... Legal recognition of homosexual unions or placing them on the same level as marriage would mean not only the approval of deviant behavior, with the consequence of making it a model in present-day society, but would also obscure basic values which belong to the common inheritance of humanity. The Church cannot fail to defend these values, for the good of men and women and for the good of society itself.

That is indeed the perennial teaching of the Catholic Church. And the Pope is now on the record dissenting from that teaching, publicly and unambiguously.

Up to this point, I've tried very hard to give Francis the benefit of the doubt. No longer. The Pope has made it abundantly clear that his mind is not with the Mind of the Church. He doesn't believe in the Sacred Deposit of the Magisterium. He doesn't feel bound to the Church's traditions.

Some readers will accept that implicitly. Others will not. So, let's be very clear: One of the first principles of Catholic social teaching is that immoral acts must not be given legal sanction. That's why the Church plainly teaches that abortion (CCC, 2273) and pornography (CCC, 2354) should be prohibited by law. We as Catholics believe that civil authorities must not condone vice, even implicitly.

For the Pope — or any Catholic — to endorse same-sex civil unions is wicked. It follows the exact same logic that [many politicians] uses to justify support for abortion: "I'm personally opposed to killing babies in the womb, but I wouldn't impose that view on women who want to kill their babies." The Pope has just made that exact same argument for male sodomy.

This may be the most significant moment in papal history since Paul VI published *Humanae Vitae*. In fact, Francis's comments are a kind of diabolical inversion of *Humanae Vitae*.

When he ruled that artificial contraception was always and everywhere immoral, Pope Paul VI

was addressing a live debate in the Church that had never been definitively resolved. And not only did he go against popular opinion: he contradicted many of his own leading theologians, including many "conservatives." As for Francis, nobody was expecting him to weigh in on this matter. This was a spontaneous remark, and on a matter that has long been settled by Church authorities. Only a small handful of "mainstream" theologians and bishops have ever signaled their support for civil unions.

Pope Paul defended the Magisterium against vast legions of Sexual Revolutionaries outside the Vatican walls and their many fifth-columnists within. Francis has raised the white flag to the Sexual Revolution without their firing so much as a peashooter in his direction.

Some Catholics will take this as proof that Francis is consciously working to subvert traditional Church teaching Others will assume he's just theologically illiterate and, frankly, not very bright. Still others will conclude that he's prone to spouting off on topics he neither understands nor really cares to understand. Many think he's going senile, which might be the most charitable view. But I'll leave that for the reader to decide.

At some level, it doesn't matter. Whether the Pope is consciously or accidentally dissenting from the Church, he is dissenting from the Church. There's no question about that.

Little wonder that progressive Catholics are thrilled by the Pope's comments. Father James Martin, who has long worked to undermine the Church's teachings on homosexuality, tweeted: "This is a major step forward in the church's support for LGBTQ people." His colleague at the Jesuit-run America Magazine, Michael J. O'Loughlin, likewise wrote: "People downplaying the Pope's words, on camera, endorsing civil unions for gay couples should ask LGBT Catholics how the remarks make them feel ... I assure you this is big news." Indeed, it is.

Of course, the Catholic Left will weaponize the Pope's comments against orthodox believers. Father Daniel Horan, the wayward Franciscan, wonders "what bigoted church leaders who have been firing Catholic school teachers and parish ministers for entering into same-sex unions are thinking right now. Maybe they're thinking about what their own resignation letters might look like." No doubt. Progressive bishops and diocesan bureaucrats will use Francis's endorsement as a cudgel against orthodox Catholics in our schools, colleges, and chanceries.

What's astonishing is how many "conservative" Catholics can't see that. Ryan T. Anderson, who gained prominence as a critic of Big Trans and now teaches at the University of Dallas, also took to Twitter in *support* of Francis. Dr Anderson noted that he himself had also "proposed something like 'civil unions' for non-married people." Again, one tries to give Francis the benefit of the doubt. But that clearly crosses the line into cognitive dissonance.

Francis may be one of those fifth-columnists that Pope Paul VI opposed. Or maybe he's one of their useful idiots. But this much is perfectly clear: Pope Francis doesn't think of himself as pope.

Whatever his idea of the papacy is, he's dead wrong.

The duty of the pope is to safeguard and clarify the Sacred Deposit of the Faith. He's supposed to think with the Mind of the Church and follow the Magisterium; instead, he speaks whatever happens to be on his mind and expects the Magisterium to follow. The papacy hasn't humbled him, as it did his predecessor. It has emboldened him.

Francis embraces the worst Protestant caricature of his office. He sees himself as a man with universal competence, one given to him directly by God Himself. That competence allows him to opine authoritatively on any matter, sacred or secular, that happens to tickle his fancy. That's not what a pope is, by any stretch of the Catholic imagination.

But we know that. We also know that, when the Pope flatly contradicts the Magisterium, we may ignore him. Better yet, we can — and we must — contradict him loudly, for the sake of those who might otherwise follow the Holy Father into error. "This isn't what the Church teaches," we say. "This isn't what Catholics believe."

What a horrible burden this pope has put on the faithful. A good Catholic wants nothing more than to respect, trust, and obey the Successor of Saint Peter. Francis has made that impossible for so many. If he were really as wise and compassionate as he believes himself to be, he would recognize how many of his poor children he's leading into scandal and disbelief.

Yet sometimes a dutiful son can do nothing but resolve to be a bigger man than his father. And that's the sad situation we now find ourselves in. Pope Francis is leading our family down a dangerous path, and we can't "accompany" him on that journey. We have to plant our feet firmly in the Church's sacred traditions, and encourage our brothers and sisters to do the same.

Pray for our Holy Father, who needs our prayers now more than ever. If you love him, stand your ground. Please God, he'll turn away from his error someday. Then we, the faithful remnant, may lead him back home.



The Toxic Waste of *Roe v. Wade* by George Weigel

Great Britain's parliamentary democracy has no constitutional text, but rather a "constitution" composed of centuries of legal traditions and precedents. So when British courts make grave mistakes, those mistakes can be fixed, more or less readily, by Parliament. The American situation is quite different. Given a written constitution and the principle of judicial review, grave mistakes by the Supreme Court are exceptionally toxic and hard to remedy, as three wrongly-decided cases illustrate.

In 1857, the Court declared in Dred Scott v. Sandford that the Constitution recognized no rights inherent in black people the white majority was bound to acknowledge - and thereby accelerated the process of national dissolution leading to the Civil War, in which over 700,000 Americans killed each other. Plessy v. Ferguson, which upheld the constitutionality of racially segregated public facilities in 1896, kept Jim Crow alive, delayed the full legal implementation of the 13th and 14th amendments, and poisoned [a national political party for generations by giving inordinate weight within party counsels to segregationists, who cowed even Franklin D. Roosevelt. It took a half-century of civil rights struggle and the 1964 Civil Rights Act to begin repairing the damage Plessy had done.

Then there was Roe v. Wade and its companion case, Doe v. Bolton: the 1973 Supreme Court decisions that invented a constitutional right to abortion throughout a pregnancy. Denounced by Justice Byron White in his dissent as "an exercise in raw judicial power," Roe's effects on American political culture have been as toxic as Dred Scott and Plessy.

Defending *Roe's* abortion license has become a prime imperative for [a national political party]. And because of that, far too many Catholic politicians ... have put a

canine fealty to a shabby judicial diktat above the truth of science (the product of human conception is a unique human being) and the moral truth we can know by reason (in a just society, innocent human life is protected in law). *Roe* has also jeopardized religious freedom and the rights of conscience, corrupted the medical professions, and eroded the authority of the states to regulate medical practice.

In an attempt to buttress Roe, a three-judge plurality in 1992's Casey v. Planned Parenthood cheapened the "liberty" to which the founders pledged their "lives, fortunes, and sacred honor," reducing it to a sheer personal willfulness that turns "I Did It My Way" into the unofficial national anthem. And thanks to Roe, Supreme Court nomination hearings have become exercises in character assassination with no holds barred.

While political scientists may wonder why the defense of *Roe's* abortion license has become so fevered, comparative religious studies may provide an answer: For those who worship the totem of the imperial autonomous Self (the false god of "Me, Myself, and I"), the abortion license has become sacramental — an outward sign of the inner reality of women's autonomy; an outward sign, for men, of their acquiescence to forms of feminism that promote freedom-as-autonomy.

Unquestioning faith in that which is unworthy of faith darkens the mind, so that otherwise intelligent people are blinded to the reality of things. This was true of primitive religions, and sadly enough, similar phenomena are at work today. For other than a debilitating myopia caused by the credulous belief that abortion-on-demand is a "civil right," why would so many black political leaders support a practice that, thanks to Planned Parenthood's inner-city "reproductive health" clinics, has caused the mass slaughter of unborn black children, thereby making African-Americans the

second-largest minority group in the United States?

Today's Supreme Court agitations involve many issues, including the oversized role of the judiciary in our constitutional order. Those issues deserve a serious, thoughtful, public airing. For many of those bending every effort to defeat Judge Amy Coney Barrett's nomination to the Court, however, the meta-issue will be the defense of an abortion license they not only support, but revere. And that ultramundane reverence explains why their efforts will be so vicious. False gods often underwrite human cruelty.

A Supreme Court that hollows out or even reverses *Roe v. Wade* will not settle the American abortion debate; it will return the issue to the states, where there will be mixed results for the cause of life. But a post-*Roe* America will have expelled a rotting bone from the national throat. And that America will then have the opportunity to demonstrate, state by state, whether we are a people capable of morally serious democratic deliberation.
