

#### Six Essential Rules Every Catholic Man Should Live By

1. I nill fear, lone and honor God above all others, even at the cost of my own life.

The early Church was full of martyrs. These men didn't simply give up their lives for Christ, they faced their death with courage and — sometimes — even jokes! It is said that as Saint Lawrence was being roasted to death on an iron grill, he teasingly told his torturers, "I am done on this side, turn me over."

Christ was so real to the early Christians that they counted death as nothing so long as they could be with Him. You may not have to die for your faith. But you may suffer from "soft martyrdom," such as losing friends over your beliefs. The word "martyr" means "witness." By holding true to Christ's teachings, you are witnessing to a higher order of values.

#### 2. I will honor holy things and treat them with respect.

Once upon a time, sacred things were treated as sacred. Even in Western churches, a screen separated the sanctuary and altar from the people. This highlighted that the Mass was a holy moment, not some ordinary event.

We now live in a world that has lost a sense of the sacred. Even in some Catholic Churches, you have people who trivialize what's holy. We don't want to drag God down to our level. Sure Christ came down to us in the flesh, but this was to raise us up to share in His divine life. Jesus is your Lord. Remember this and be reverent.

#### 3. I will learn to pray as if my eternal salvation depends on it.

God created you to be in a relationship with Him. Prayer is the bedrock of this relationship. After all, how can you have a good relationship with someone if you don't talk to them regularly? Your eternal salvation depends on prayer, but don't think of this in a legalistic way. It's not as if you will be saved by saying X number of prayers. The point is that if you don't want to spend time with God here on earth, why are you going to want to spend eternity with Him? The more you pray, the stronger your soul grows. Without it, the ups and downs of life will dictate your behavior. Don't try going through life without prayer.

4. I will struggle for virtue and to overcome myself, no matter how difficult the process, not sinking to the level of mediocrity and excuse making.

The spiritual life is HARD. Christ said, "Take up your cross and follow me." If you're going to get serious about the spiritual life, it will hurt. Growing spiritually involves dying to yourself and your love of pleasure, comfort and success. Not that those things are bad in themselves, but you can't let them dominate you. That's why penance is an essential part of spiritual life. We have

5. I will prefer the Beatitudes to the world's values, remembering the truth that if anyone loves the world, love for the Father is not in Him.

The world operates by a very clear paradigm. It's the exact opposite of God's order. The world emphasizes power, pleasure, prestige, revenge and looking out only for yourself. In the Beatitudes, Christ flips all these worldly values on their heads. He says, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven." He promises eternal joy to the persecuted, suffering and forgotten. This gives hope to those without "worldly success," while also challenging those living only for this life. Try to make time to reread the Beatitudes and meditate on them frequently. We promise they will change your life!

6. I will treat others made in the image and likeness of God with dignity and respect, especially remembering to honor and to serve the poor, the weak and the rejected as I would Christ Himself.

This goes back to the two great commandments (which are really one): Love the Lord your God with your whole soul, mind and strength and love your neighbor as yourself. Each one of us is made in the image and likeness of God. This includes the poor and suffering. The saints who served the poor always said they were serving Christ Himself. And Christ said that we would be judged by how we treated the least among us. Go out of your way to love and serve others, especially those who can't give anything in return. Otherwise, you don't really love God.

These are life-changing principles that will make you holier and happier!
Start looking for ways to incorporate them into your life.
The world needs men who live by these values.
It needs YOU to set an example!

## Cursing and Christian Living by David G Bonagura, Jr.

In rebuking the Pharisees for misunderstanding the heart of the Mosaic Law, our Lord issued a declaration, unprovoked by the immediate context, that reverberates today: "The things that come out of the mouth come from the heart, and they defile." (Matthew 15:18)

What is in the heart that our words manifest? Again, our Lord is quite direct: "From the heart come evil thoughts, murder, adultery, unchastity, theft, false witness, blasphemy. These are what defile a person." (Matthew 15:19-20)

That is, a host of unholy, sinful desires — they are collectively called "concupiscence" — joust within us every waking moment, and through our impure words they percolate into the world. Unholy speech comes in many kinds: gossip, detraction, calumny, deceit, lying, cheating, complaining, berating, lamenting, cursing. Controlling our tongues can seem like a Sisyphean task, as even the New Testament acknowledges: "If anyone does not fall short in speech, he is a perfect man." (James 3:1)

Of all these sins, the phenomenon of cursing provides a special window through which we perceive three critical facets of Christian living: the disorder of the soul, the need for self-discipline, the place of the Christian in the world.

In casual speech and tense situations, curse words punctuate nearly every sentence, especially among groups of men. Wielded as nouns, verbs, adjectives, and interjections (some four-letter words can be all four), curse words, the speaker believes, add emphasis and drama to the narrative. And they are accepted by society as part of the lexical landscape.

Coaching youth sports, I have found that children begin cursing quietly among themselves around age eight; by age ten they do so openly on the field and on the court, where they may perhaps receive a mild reprimand, but the adults around them largely look the other way — they are using the same words themselves.

Yes, curse words reveal disorder in our souls, which are torn between concupiscence and the God who calls us to perfection in Him. More than that, though, the nonchalance with which curse words are uttered points to a great danger of the spiritual life: the acceptance of sin as a normal part of living — not as something

to be fought daily and eradicated.

From there it is but a few steps to dismissing sin as a reality altogether, as our modern age has done so effectively. A worse conclusion can follow: the cavalier and pernicious attitude of "I'm going to Hell anyway, so what difference does it make what I say or do?"

This is the defilement that our Lord speaks of, and Saint Francis de Sales brilliantly captures the insidious danger that habitual cursing can generate:

An impure word falling upon a weak mind spreads its infection like a drop of oil on a garment, and sometimes it will take such a hold of the heart, as to fill it with an infinitude of lascivious thoughts and temptations.



This is also an infection that spreads not only in the heart of the listener but in the speaker himself. Mortal sinners are not born but made through the slow, cancerous growth first of vice and then of venial sins.

Growing up in a milieu where curse words are as common as any other, young people, without the benefit of a surrounding Christian culture, logically conclude that "this is how adults talk" and follow suit. To resist the false allure of this vocabulary requires tremendous self-discipline, especially when first trying to break the habit.

Most will not succeed if motivated only by the temporal desire to cleanse one's vocabulary. But if we realize that cursing is displeasing to God Who loves us more than imaginable, we can acquire much-needed supernatural motivation to master our tongues. And if we can resist the temptation to curse, we will develop the virtue of selfrestraint that will keep us from falling into other temptations.

I remain ever grateful to the young postcollegian leading me and a group of collegians through Europe years ago. He chastised me after I let go a few curse words when we could not figure out the trains. The rebuke stung — but I immediately understood that if I wanted to be a sincere Catholic, I had to lasso my tongue. With concerted effort and God's grace, it took only two more weeks for me to let go of those words for good.

To refrain from cursing in a curse-filled world is a constant reminder that Christians are never completely at home in this world. Conversations and situations filled with vice or sin should prick our consciences, for we know they are wrong. To be Christian can mean being alone with the Lord, suffering in silence, while simultaneously being surrounded by others in public.

Frankly, I have never had the courage to rebuke my fellow adults for their colorful language, though I am not sure it would do much good. What has been interesting over the years, however, is that acquaintances and associates of various kinds have noticed that I do not use these words and have commented in a complimentary way to that end on several occasions. Simply refraining from curse words, to my surprise, has served as a means of silent evangelization. In a world filled with profane words, not joining the racket can witness to the Truth.

We need not be pure of heart to strive to root out vices — including small ones like cursing — and embrace virtue. Doing so can transform defilement into sanctification, but only with God's grace. So let us heed the exhortation of Saint Paul: "Let the peace of Christ control your hearts, the peace into which you were also called in one body. And be thankful." (Colossians 3:15)

## What's Wrong with the World? by Msgr. Charles Fink

Saint Dominic is often quoted as having said, "A man who governs his passions is master of the world. We must either rule them or be ruled by them. It is better to be the hammer than the anvil."

A corollary follows. To the extent that we can't control ourselves, it will be necessary that we be controlled by an outside force, police, for example, or some other government entity. Either that or things become uncontrollable.

This isn't an original thought, of course. It's why our Founding Fathers believed that our constitutional republic could only survive and thrive, as envisioned, if its people were moral and religious. Religion, Christianity in particular, if taken seriously, engenders internal control, helps us to live in harmony with others, and limits the need for external constraints.

We see this truth played out in families, schools, and society at large. Good kids, good students, good citizens require fewer external constraints than unruly, undisciplined, misbehaving ones. It's not rocket science, just common sense. It should be obvious. And it's one reason, not the only one, that I'm a Catholic priest. I'm in the self-control business. I'm into promoting restraint and discipline as the path to individual, familial, and societal peace, freedom, and happiness.

Unfortunately, I and those of a similar mindset, including the official Church, have failed miserably in making our case, in consequence of which freedom has come to be understood largely as the right to do anything we please, so long as it doesn't immediately injure anyone else.

The trouble is that the damage we do by espousing and living out this view isn't always immediate or obvious. Think of drug or alcohol abuse, or any other addiction, and notice how what seems in such cases to begin as an exercise of freedom soon leads to a kind of slavery.

When enough people go down this path of unbridled freedom, there aren't enough police in the world to control the criminals; there aren't enough laws in the land to control the chaos; and there isn't enough money pumped into our schools to make them safe and effective.

But we seem never to learn. We keep looking for the quick fix. Our politicians and media pundits forever speak in superficial sound bites and address symptoms rather than root causes. In fact, we're not allowed to talk about root causes. That's perceived as being judgmental and as suggesting the imposition of an outdated and presumptively debilitating moral code.

There may be darker motives in this fixation on avoiding underlying issues. I prefer simply to presume that people are naturally inclined to look for magic-wand solutions to the problems they face. As T.S. Eliot once noted, they can't bear much reality.



Of course, we need to address serious problems as quickly and effectively as possible, but our proffered solutions will always remain ultimately fruitless unless the underlying causes are addressed, and this is seldom done. Indeed, we often wind up throwing gasoline on the fire.

At the same time that we engage in an ineffective war on drugs, we legalize the growing and sale of cannabis. Let's say there is some merit to this policy. Is it a good idea to turn a blind eye to the practice of routinely getting stoned? Is getting high on a regular basis good for the individual? Good for society?

Would a society of individuals exercising self-control such that very few ever even wanted to get high be a worse or better society? In such a society, would there be a profitable market for illegal drugs? Would there be as many fatal car accidents as we currently have? On balance, would money be lost or saved, lives lost or saved?

We might ask the same kinds of questions with respect to the proliferation and acceptance of pornography. Is it good for anyone on any significant level? Does it contribute to the general welfare or to the degradation of society, possibly contributing to the nightmarish reality of human trafficking? Is not asking such questions responsible or thoughtful? Do only rightwing Christian fanatics ask them, and hypocritically at that?

I don't want to impose anything on anyone, but I would like to propose that "If it is good, do it" is a better principle by which to live than "If it feels good, do it." Bishop Robert Barron, in one of his talks at World Youth Day in Portugal, said: "Freedom is disciplining the desires so as to make the achievement of the good first possible and then effortless."

The effortless part may take some time and effort, but it's worth it. I think I'm a better person for it, and a better neighbor too. You'd be safe living next door to me, even if I owned a gun.

There's much to be said for learning to control our passions. It's not suppression of desires; it's freedom, and it's possible for nearly everyone. As Frank Sheed once put it, "I'll believe someone has an uncontrollable temper when I see him take a swing at [the champion boxer] Joe Lewis."

What's needed, then, is the proper motivation, and given the condition of our society, for those not too far gone down the road to slavery, that motivation should be visible for all to see.

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
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
