CHRISTMAS MEDITATION

The Nativity

- 1. Four thousand years had passed since God promised to our first parents that a Redeemer should come to free the world from the curse that had fallen upon it when Adam was disobedient to the Divine Command. Prophets and kings had desired to see the day when that Promise should be fulfilled, but had not seen it. The whole world had long expected the day of Redemption. God always is slow in His best Gifts. Hence, let us learn to be patient. "He will surely come. He will not tarry."
- 2. All the world was at peace at the moment when Christ was born. The angry passions of men were hushed as if in compliment to the Prince of Peace. He never comes where strife and confusion prevail. If we desire that He should come into our hearts today, we must resolve to keep control of our evil passions, and the self-will that dares to do battle against the Will of God.
- 3. But when the Gift came at last, It was a Gift worthy of the Divine Generosity. It was a Gift of infinite value, given to all and each of the sons of men. It was a Gift in which God gave Himself to be wholly ours. The little Infant in the cradle before Whom we kneel today is the Omnipotent God, loving us with an immeasurable Love; our King, our Lord, our Redeemer, our best Friend, the Divine Lover of our souls. Oh, would that we loved Him more!



Heaven

Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither hath it entered into the heart of man what things God hath prepared for them that love Him. (I Corinthians 2:9)

- 1. These words convey the best idea that the Apostle who had been carried up into the third Heaven could give of the happiness of the redeemed. All the loveliest things we have ever seen are as nothing in comparison to the sight of Heaven; all the sweetest sounds are discord compared with the music of Heaven; all the joys that have made the longest hours only too short do not deserve the name of joy compared with the joys of Heaven. One moment of Heaven is worth them all!
- 2. Whatever God does He does on a scale worthy of Himself. The happiness of Heaven will be immeasurable from the fact of its being in union with the God of infinite Love and Beauty. It will be a joy like the joy of Our Lord Himself, since He will say to each of the redeemed: "Enter into the joy of your Lord." Are we doing what we can to insure that those words are being addressed to us?
- 3. In Heaven all will be perfectly happy. Even those who have the lowest places will have all that their hearts desire. There will be no unsatisfied wish in Heaven, no craving after what we do not possess. Every one will have an overflowing cup of pleasure. Oh, what fools we are not to do more to insure the joy of Heaven!

Let us pray that we may often think of Heaven and its joys.

Christmas, the Infinite, and the Finite by George Weigel December 21, 2011

The title of Father Edward Oakes' ... book, **Infinity Dwindled to Infancy**, nicely captures the imaginative challenge posed at Christmas: the Mystery of the infinite God become finite man. In truth, however, the challenge to our imaginations has less to do with the *how* of ... this marvelous exchange than with the *why*.

Posit an all-powerful and infinite God, and most of us wouldn't have too much trouble with the idea that such a God *could* do anything, including coming into the finite world He created. The real question is *why* such a God would want to do such a thing: to submit His Divinity to the limits of our humanity, to dwindle into infancy and then to go farther to die as a tortured criminal at the hands of His own creatures. Here is the "scandal" of Christianity. For the answer faith gives to the question of *why* is Salvific Love: a Love so great that it required, not an argument, but a demonstration.

Eastern Christian theology helps us understand the full dimensions of the *why* of the Incarnation through its concept of *theosis*, or divinization: God becomes man so that we might become like God so that we can live comfortably with God forever. Here, then, is the *marvelous exchange*. God "exchanges" His Divinity for our humanity, thus enabling us to "exchange" our weakness for His Divine Glory — the Glory of which the angels sing to the shepherds of Bethlehem. The years Saint Paul spent in the desert, pondering just how the Paschal Mystery of Christ's Death and Resurrection, which had been revealed to him on the road to Damascus, fulfilled God's election of Israel, led the Apostle to the



Gentiles to be the first to formulate this *exchange*: "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sake He became poor, so that by His poverty you might become rich" [II Corinthians 8:9].

The Fathers of the Church took up the theme and developed the idea that, in the "exchange," men and women were empowered to become godlike. Thus Saint Gregory Nazianzen: "Let us seek to be like Christ, because Christ also became like us: to become gods through Him since He Himself, through us, became a man. He took the worst upon Himself to make us a Gift of the best." If the language of "becoming gods" strikes our ears as odd, that may be because we have not quite plumbed the radical depths of the Divine Love: for in the Incarnation, "God so loved the world" [John 3:16] that He doubled-down on the Divine Humility, dwindling Himself into infancy so that we could share, really and truly, in the Divine Life.

The indictment of Christianity that began in the 18th Century and metastasized in the 19th was that the God of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Jesus kept humanity infantile, such that only by throwing the God of the Bible over the side could humanity ever achieve maturity and liberation. This was, of course, a complete inversion of the Truth: the Christian faith, proclaimed by the Second Letter of Peter, is that God, by the Incarnation, has made us "partakers of the Divine Nature" [II Peter 1:4]. And in doing so, the Divine Humility, manifest as Love, brings us into the fullness of human maturation and the fullness of true freedom. Thus Pope Saint Leo the Great, in the Christmas homily the Church reads in the Office of Readings for Christmas Day, could admonish his Roman congregation in 440: "Realize, O Christian, your dignity. Once made a partaker in the Divine Nature, do not return to your former baseness by a life unworthy of that dignity."

Christmas faith inspires righteous living, not by fear, but by Love: the Love that expresses Itself in history in the humility of the Incarnation and the Holy Birth; the Love that speaks of the Glory of God, "wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger" [Luke 2:12]

He Who Speaks to You by Hippolytus

God, subsisting alone, and having nothing contemporaneous with Himself, determined to create the world. And conceiving the world in mind, and willing and uttering the word, He made it; and straightway it appeared, formed as it had pleased Him.

For us, then, it is sufficient simply to know that there was nothing contemporaneous with God. Beside Him there was nothing; but He, while existing alone, yet existed in plurality. For He was neither without reason, nor wisdom, nor power, nor counsel. And all things were in Him, and He was the All.

When He willed, and as He willed, He manifested His word in the times determined by Him, and by Him He made all things. When He wills, He does; and when He thinks, He executes; and when He speaks, He manifests; when He fashions, He contrives in wisdom. For all things that are made He forms by reason and wisdom — creating them in reason, and arranging them in wisdom.

He made them, then, as He pleased, for He was God. And as the Author, and fellow-Counsellor, and Framer of the things that are in formation, He begot the Word; and as He bears this Word in Himself, and that, too, as (yet) invisible to the world which is created, He makes Him visible; (and) uttering the voice first, and begetting Him as Light of Light, He set Him forth to the world as its Lord, (and) His own mind; and whereas He was visible formerly to Himself alone, and invisible to the world which is made, He makes Him visible in order that the world might see Him in His manifestation, and be capable of being saved.

And thus there appeared another beside Himself. But when I say another, I do not mean that there are two Gods, but that it is only as light of light, or as water from a fountain, or as a ray from the sun. For there is but one power, which is from the All; and the Father is the All, from Whom comes this Power, the Word. And this is the mind which came forth into the world, and was manifested as the Son of God ...

And Who is He that is made manifest but the Word of the Father? — Whom the Father sent, and in Whom He showed to men the Power proceeding from Him. Thus, then, was the Word made manifest, even as the blessed John says. For he sums up the things that were said by the prophets, and shows that this is the Word, by Whom all things were made.

For he speaks to this effect: In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. All things were made by Him, and without Him was not anything made. And beneath He says: The world was made by Him, and the world knew Him not; He came unto His own, and His own received Him not. If, then, said he, the world was made by Him, according to the word of the prophet, By the Word of the Lord were the heavens made, then this is the Word that was also made manifest.

We accordingly see the Word incarnate, and we know the Father by Him, and we believe in the Son, (and) we worship the Holy Spirit . . .

Now Jeremiah says: Who has stood in the counsel of the Lord, and has perceived His Word? But the Word of God alone is visible, while the word of man is audible. When he speaks of seeing the Word, I must believe that this visible (Word) has been sent. And there was none other (sent) but the Word. And that He was sent Peter testifies, when he says to the centurion Cornelius: God sent His Word unto the children of Israel by the preaching of Jesus Christ. This is the God Who is Lord of all. If, then, the Word is sent by Jesus Christ, the Will of the Father is Jesus Christ.

These things then, brethren, are declared by the Scriptures. And the blessed John, in the testimony of his Gospel, gives us an account of this economy (disposition) and acknowledges this Word as God, when he says' In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

If, then, the Word was with God, and was also God, what follows? Would one say that he speaks of two Gods? I shall not indeed speak of two Gods, but of one; of two Persons however, and of a third economy (disposition), viz., the grace of the Holy Ghost. For the Father indeed is One, but there are two Persons, because there is also the Son; and then there is the third, the Holy Spirit. The Father decrees, the Word executes, and the Son is manifested, through Whom the Father is believed on.

The economy of harmony is led back to one God; for God is One. It is the Father Who commands, and the Son Who obeys, and the Holy Spirit Who gives understanding: the Father Who is above all, and the Son Who is through all, and the Holy Spirit Who is in all.

And we cannot otherwise think of one God, but by believing in truth in Father and Son and Holy Spirit. For the Jews glorified (or gloried in) the Father, but gave Him not thanks, for they did not recognize the Son. The disciples recognized the Son, but not in the Holy Ghost; wherefore they also denied Him.

The Father's Word, therefore, knowing the economy (disposition) and the Will of the Father, to wit, that the Father seeks to be worshipped in none other way than this, gave this charge to the disciples after He rose from the dead: Go and teach all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. And by this He showed, that whosoever omitted any one of these, failed in glorifying God perfectly. For it is through this Trinity that the Father is glorified. For the Father willed, the Son did, the Spirit manifested. The whole Scriptures, then, proclaim this truth ...

Rest satisfied with the word spoken by Christ, viz., That which is born of the Spirit is spirit, just as, speaking by the prophet of the generation of the Word, He shows the fact that He is begotten, but reserves the question of the manner and means, to reveal it only in the time determined by Himself. For He speaks thus: From the womb, before the morning star, I have begotten You.

This (is He who) breathes upon the disciples, and gives them the Spirit, and comes in among them when the doors are shut, and is taken up by a cloud into the heavens while the disciples gaze at Him, and is set down on the right hand of the Father, and comes again as the Judge of the living and the dead. This is the God Who for our sakes became man, to Whom also the Father has put all things in subjection. To Him be the Glory and the Power, with the Father and the Holy Spirit, in the holy Church both now and ever, and even for evermore. Amen.

Hippolytus of Rome (c. 170 A.D. — c. 235 A.D.) was a Bishop of Rome and one of the most important Second—Third Centuries Christian theologians.





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
