

Gordian Knots and Artful DOGERS by Robert Royal

An ancient Greek legend tells of Alexander the Great confronting the Gordian Knot, which no one could untie. An oracle prophesied that whoever untied it would rule the East. Alexander drew his sword and cut it in half. In another version, the knot was tied around a chariot pole; Alexander slipped the pole out, and that did the trick. Either way, the lesson is: some things don't yield to the some should. But there are many ways that subsidies undermine freedom even usual approaches. They require a leap to unprecedented measures.

... Some of our knots required the swift Alexandrian sword: Boys and men in girls' bathrooms (and sports), surgically disfiguring children, criminal illegals roaming American streets, open borders, DEI racism masquerading as antiracism, support for gay comic books in Ecuador or LGBT plays in Ireland, and how many other absurdities? There's no point in administrative or congressional "investigations" into such things. That would be a further waste of time and resources much needed elsewhere. You just stop them and those who did them.

So, Kudos to ... DOGE. But now begins the harder part, which calls for a debt, budget deficits, and potential bankruptcy? certain finesse.

though the main concepts haven't been much in play. There was implicit recognition, for instance, of the Catholic idea of the family as the primary cell of society in the confused discussion of Vice President Vance's assertion about the ordo amoris.

But the central Catholic social principles are human dignity, the common good, solidarity, and subsidiarity. We need serious attention to these because they've been subtly undermined and would help greatly, properly applied.

Human Dignity, for instance, is widely taken for granted, but it's often presented as if all people and ways of life are equally acceptable. (Several American bishops have even used it as an argument against deportations) Last year's Vatican document Dignitas infinita rightly says that we remain made in the image of God, whatever our sins. But it doesn't nearly warn enough about what once was obvious: that our sins disfigure that image and are a rejection of portions of our own dignity.

The Common Good is a complicated notion that cannot be much discussed here ... But it can't simply mean some sort of collectivism. Indeed, quite the opposite. The U.S. Constitution similarly speaks of "promoting the general welfare," but the Founding Fathers feared runaway government and restricted the Federal republic to carefully enumerated powers.

Education, for instance, contributes to the general welfare, but there's a reason why there was no department of education until 1979 (almost 200 years after the Constitution was ratified); education inevitably involves community values and moral questions better handled at the local and state level - i.e., not the federal government's business.

Catholic social principles of *solidarity* and *subsidiarity* help to understand why. For present purposes, solidarity is clear enough - it's a virtue, a dedication to care for others, but with limits of its own to guard it from totalitarian temptations, which is why we also have subsidiarity.

Here's the classic passage about subsidiarity from Quadragesimo anno (1931): As history abundantly proves, it is true that on account of changed conditions many things which were done by small associations in former times cannot be done now save by large associations. Still, that most weighty principle, which cannot be set aside or changed, remains fixed and unshaken in social philosophy. Just as it is gravely wrong to take from individuals what they can accomplish by their own initiative and industry and give it to the community, so also it is an injustice and at the same time a grave evil and disturbance of right order to assign to a greater and higher association what lesser and subordinate organizations can do.

Subsidiarity identifies the proper role of the State: "the more perfectly a graduated order is kept among the various associations ... the happier and more prosperous the condition of the State."

Subsidiarity has often been given two different emphases that, oversimplifying some, I'll call American and European.

In the American version, the family, the school, the neighborhood, the church - the "civil society" institutions - are meant to be in varying degrees free from the state. The highest levels exist to ensure freedom and order in the lower ones.

In the European version — again, simplifying — the subsidiary institutions primarily receive subsidies. The last time I looked, the European Union had about 30,000 NGOs, over half of them receiving EU subsidies, as do the individual European countries (We've learned in recent days, that the U.S. government has been increasingly doing the same sort of thing with ideologically selected "nonprofits")

The problem is not subsidiary institutions receiving government support; when they are not used for partisan purposes. Government grants come with strings attached. Rightly so, if there's to be "oversight" and accountability. But the dangers to their free functioning are obvious Just look at how "science" has been politicized.

So, after the sword phase, we're going to need real finesse in reforms. Classical questions such as how much support hurts rather than helps the poor by creating dependency? When should government be involved, and not, in medical matters? Which budget items are urgent and which not given colossal

In other words, how now do we artfully slip the chariot pole out of the There's been a bit of talk in these heady days about Catholic social principles, tangled mass, to bring out a better order than the one we once thought could never change?

Maybe a strong dose of Catholic social thought.
