

Judge Again Attempts to Compel Little Sisters of the Poor to Provide Birth Control by Charles J. Russo

To put it bluntly, the decision in *Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and State of New Jersey v. Trump, Kennedy, et al.*, filed on August 13, 2025, is a travesty.

Blatantly ignoring two Supreme Court cases to the contrary — in 2016 and 2020 — upholding the rights of the Little Sisters of the Poor, a federal trial court judge, as she did previously, invalidated the religious and moral exemptions the Trump administration put in place in 2017 by the inaptly named Affordable Care Act's contraception mandate.

Trampling the First Amendment rights of the Little Sisters to the free exercise of religion, the judge ordered them to provide for contraceptives, including abortifacients, in their healthcare plans or face significant fines.

In light of the serious threat to religious freedom this order poses, this column summarizes the dispute's history before reflecting on its impact and why it is likely to be struck down on appeal.

The original so-called Affordable Care Act required employers, including nonprofit organizations such as the Little Sisters, whose ministry has been caring for the elderly poor since their founding in 1839, to pay for contraceptives, including abortifacients, in their employees' health insurance plans. The Act deceptively described this requirement as an "essential health benefit" using the euphemism "preventative and wellness services." Remarkably, abortion proponents refer to these medications as healthcare. They clearly disregard the well-being of innocent lives in the womb in killing the most innocent and defenseless among us.

The Act's original mandate granted many exemptions, but not for religious organizations and orders such as the Little Sisters. As controversy emerged in 2016, the Supreme Court ruled in favor of the Sisters and other organizations, exempting them from the disputed provision. Solidifying this judgment, in 2017, the Trump administration promulgated a regulation granting religious and moral exemptions from the contraception mandate that was challenged almost immediately.

Subsequently, in 2020, in *Little Sisters of the Poor Saints Peter and Paul Home v. Pennsylvania*, in a 7-2 judgment in which Justices Kagan and Breyer, ordinarily pro-abortion advocates, concurred, upheld the 2017 regulation. The 2017 trial court opinion in the original round of litigation in Pennsylvania striking down the Trump exemption, in which the Little Sisters were not named, was written by Judge Wendy Beetlestone.

Appointed by President Obama, Beetlestone is the author of the opinion in *Trump et al.* She argued that she could not imagine an exception that "intrude[d]' more in the lives of women." Too bad the judge did not demonstrate such concern for the rights of the (young) women who were not allowed to be born, whether because the mothers used birth control medications or had abortions.

Officials in Pennsylvania and New Jersey, joined by California, Massachusetts, New York, and other pro-abortion jurisdictions, continued to challenge the process by which the 2017 regulation was adopted. Without so much as conducting a hearing at which the Little Sisters' attorneys could speak, Beetlestone, now chief judge for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania, invalidated the rules as "arbitrary and capricious" in violation of the federal APA or Administrative Procedures Act's notice-and-comment requirement.

The judge grounded her opinion in the procedural rather than substantive argument that the APA was exempted from the recent Supreme Court ban on nationwide injunctions. Judge Beetlestone argued that the 2017 regulation "greatly expanded that exemption and accommodation framework," adding it would "allow more entities to stop providing contraceptive coverage, which will result in more women residents seeking contraceptive care through Statefunded programs," vacating them "in their entirety."

In disagreeing with a federal regulation and Supreme Court precedent, Judge Beetlestone disregarded the fact that the regulation was designed to ensure the religious freedom rights of the Little Sisters and other organizations dedicated to preserving the sanctity of life of the unborn in the safety of their mothers' wombs. As such, it is important to place the judicial activism revealed in her universal injunction in context.

This Obama-appointed jurist's order stands in stark contrast to Chief Justice Roberts' 2018 statement that "[w]e do not have Obama judges or Trump judges, Bush judges or Clinton judges. What we have is an extraordinary group of dedicated judges doing their level best to do equal right to those appearing before them."

As edifying as Roberts' words might sound, they are belied by the fact that a very different picture to the contrary emerges in a 2024 article in *Harvard Law Review*. According to this study of "the 64 nationwide injunctions issued against Trump policies, only 5 were issued by judges appointed by a Republican, leaving 92.2% of injunctions issued by a judge appointed by a Democrat." A March 2025 report from the Congressional Research Service confirmed and added to these numbers.

Moreover, as reflected in the lawfare against the second Trump administration, through early August 2025, federal trial court judges issued at least 110 nationwide injunctions. During Trump's first administration, courts handed down 64 such orders out of the total of 127 nationwide injunctions issued since 1963. The 127 total consists of six against George W. Bush, twelve against Obama, sixty four against the first Trump Administration, and fourteen from the first three years of the Biden administration.

Because of this, the United States is at risk of becoming subject to an "imperial Judiciary" seeking to dominate the other coequal branches of government that Justice Barrett decried in her majority opinion in *Trump v. CASA*, largely banning this practice.

Regardless of the issue at hand, federal trial court judges must do two things. First, jurists must restrict their orders to their districts within their jurisdictions. Second, echoing Chief Justice Roberts' notion that judges must be umpires, not rule makers, unelected federal jurists must put the law and religious freedom ahead of ideology, especially when disputes involve the left's most sacred "sacrament": abortion.

The important underlying principle in *Trump et al.* is the significance of defending a fundamental American right: religious freedom. Yet abortion supporters go to great lengths to force their will on believers by working to coerce faith-based organizations to violate their sincerely held beliefs in the need to protect the lives of the unborn. It is also troubling that Americans have to seek a governmental exemption from an Act that substantially burdens their right to religious freedom by requiring them to violate their deeply held pro-life beliefs by dispensing birth control pills, including abortifacients.

When Trump et al. is appealed, it is imperative for the judiciary to safeguard the religious freedom rights of the Little Sisters and other

such organizations. If the Third Circuit fails to reverse in favor of the Little Sisters, the Supreme Court, under the direction of Chief Justice John Roberts (who has not always been willing to rein in lower courts), must set limits. Should it get that far, the Supreme Court should build on its earlier precedent in litigation involving the Little Sisters by emphasizing that these unconstitutional universal injunctions, especially those attacking religious freedom, are unacceptable.

In sum, universal injunctions, as in *Trump et al.*, are inappropriate because they have the impermissible effect of trammeling believers' First Amendment religious freedoms. But also, even more

importantly, they seek to compel them to violate their God-given rights to live in accord with their faiths by protecting the unborn.

Astronomy for the Soul by Regis Martin

If you shut your eyes so that you never have to see the stars, refusing ever to stand enraptured beneath the heavens, you might as well be dead. In fact, you may already be dead, only the coroner hasn't come round yet to confirm it.

"There was a time when I gazed upon the stars with great wonder and amazement," declared Aldous Huxley, author of **Brave New World**, a dystopian novel that has never gone out of print. "Now, late in life, I look up at the heavens in the same way in which I gaze upon the faded wall-paper in a railway station waiting room."

Now there's an icebreaker. And, of course, for people who have never even seen a railway station, nearly all the passenger trains having disappeared, that, too, may be a source of wonder. More and more, it seems, we live in an age in which everything has become flat as a map. Nobody is looking up at the stars, either because they are indifferent to them or, owing to light pollution, they simply can't see them. The modern world has a way of doing that to people. Almost as if, to recall Nietzsche's prediction, someone had taken a sponge and wiped clean away the entire horizon. Or, as Marx would have it, everything solid melts into thin air.

No sense of awe or mystery can survive so sweeping a reductionism. Chesterton was spot-on when he said about the world that while it will not starve for want of wonders, it will most certainly starve for want of wonder. It is, alas, an impoverishment in which increasingly we now find ourselves. We have lost all sense of the hieratic, the sacred, what a wise old philosopher friend was wont to call "the poetry of the transcendent." In short, we are witnessing the wholesale disenchantment of the world, a place where not only is the numinous not welcome, it is scarcely even recognizable.

How far we have fallen away from our ancestors, for whom the world was suffused with a sense of the sacred, positively drenched in the divine. It would never have occurred to the Greeks, for example, to ask

about the place of the gods in the polis. "The gods are everywhere," exclaimed Thales, the earliest of their philosophers, who, such was his fascination for the heavens, actually fell into a well while gazing upon them. We should all be so lucky. "The universe," as Saint Bonaventure was not the first to remind us, "is a ladder by which we ascend to God." If that is so, then secularism is what happens when a society decides to dismantle the ladder.

How on earth would the Magi have managed to find their way to Bethlehem without a star to guide them? It was certainly no ordinary light in the sky which drew them from a distant land to a place where the very Messiah of God was waiting to be born. "It was as though they had always been waiting for that star," writes Pope Benedict XVI in a commentary on the nature of the desire which prompted the Magi to leave everything behind. "It was as if the journey had always been a part of their destiny, and was finally about to begin."

For what other reason did God give us desire if not to follow the star that finally leads us to Him? Isn't that why the etymology of the two words is the same, i.e., *sidera*, which is Latin for the heavens? Or that sailors lost at sea will often chart their safe return by simply observing those same heavens?

"The stars speak to secularized man," Pope Saint John Paul II noted in a homily on the feast of the Epiphany in 2002, "awakening in him the nostalgia of his condition as pilgrim in search of the Truth with a deep desire for the Absolute."

But do they still speak to us in that way? Are we not nowadays adrift on a sea where there are no stars, only the darkness above and beyond? And if there are hints of heavenly light, glints of glory breaking through the clouds to remind us of a world beyond the one we measure out like so many coffee spoons, how many of us are there on the lookout for them?

We live in a closed world, a world untethered to the transcendent, in which "the buffered self" shapes all that we see and do. That is an apt phrase, coined by the philosopher Charles Taylor, who meant by

the term an identity totally closed in upon itself, allowing no shaft of light beyond the borders of the self-centered self. Until the modern age, argues Taylor, there were no buffered souls, no horizons bound only by immediate sensory experience. People lived in a larger world, a world visited by angels and demons, a world into which God Himself might, at any moment, suddenly descend.

The late Msgr. Lorenzo Albacete, who dedicated his first book, God at the Ritz, to the founder of Communion and Liberation, Luigi Giussani, "who helped me see the Milky Way," describes an encounter the latter had with a young couple making out in a car. "Hello," he said, suddenly appearing in his cassock. "I hate to interrupt; I just have one question to ask you: What you're doing now, what has it to do with the stars."

At what moment, in other words, do we allow the stars, which aim to lure us on to God, permission to do their job — and thus draw us more easily into the ways of eternity? Can there ever be an *I* without a *Thon*, a finite self not in relation to an *Infinite Other*?

In order, therefore, for commerce between the two to happen, to ease the exchange between the two realms, the unreal world of secularism — which has largely succeeded in driving a wedge between eternity and time, God and the self — will have to go. All those structures that conspire to keep God at bay, that impede our even having to think about Him, much less make provision for Him in our lives, will simply have to be dismantled.

A genuine astronomy of the soul requires no less.

Survey: 9 of 10 Cradle Catholics Leaving Church by Charlie McCarthy

More and more Americans who were raised Catholic are leaving the church, according to a recent survey.

The *General Social Survey* (GSS) found that 62% of Americans raised Catholic said they no longer identified as being a member of the Church.

That percentage fell from 84% in 1973 and 74% in 2002.

Even worse numbers for the Catholic Church concern Americans raised in the faith and still attending Mass every Sunday.

In 1973, roughly 34% of all those raised Catholic were attending Mass weekly. That percentage fell to 20% by 2002 and 11% by 2022

Basically, 9 out of 10 cradle Catholics are leaving at a time the church is led by American-born Pope Leo XIV, who was elevated to his position in May.

"If these trends continue, then even with ongoing significant levels of Catholic immigration (which mitigate, or rather mask, our domestic decline), the size of the American Church will shrink dramatically in the decades to come," authors Michael Rota and Stephen Bullivant wrote in the University of Notre Dame's *Church Life Journal*.

"Simply put, no realistic amount of evangelizing new people, or bringing back those 'prodigals' who have left — mission-critical as both those apostolates are — can make up for these kinds of losses."

Rota, philosophy professor at the University of Saint Thomas, and Bullivant, theology and sociology professor at Saint Mary's University, examined the decline in religious practice among Catholic-born Americans using GSS data. They suggested that the Church, in trying to combat the loss of followers, work to create stronger community ties, especially among children.

"Before the 1950s, the average Catholic youth would have looked around in their social circle and seen a lot of consensus about faith [and] about the importance of worshiping God in some religion or

denomination," Rota told EWTN on Aug. 13. "Today, it's not like that.

"[Young Catholics] are much more likely to have many non-Catholic friends, probably non-Catholic family members. In the culture at large, there's many anti-Catholic and anti-religious voices. So that puts pressure on youth as they grow up."

The Catholic Church, though, is not the only religion suffering in the U.S.

In 2013, 72% of Americans considered religion to be the most important thing in their lives, or among many important things. In 2023, only 53% said the same.

"When the internet hit the scene, in the late '90s, we [saw] a huge spike in the percentage of youth who don't identify with any religion," Rota said Catholic News Agency reported.

"Human beings are socialized by their families, their close social network, but also by the culture that they're in. And what the internet and smartphones have done is change the balance of what's doing more work."



Pew Survey: Decline of Christianity in U.S. Has Slowed by Brian Freeman

The drop in the number of Americans who identify as Christian appears to be slowing down in recent years after a long period of a higher level of decreases, according to a Pew Research Center survey published on Wednesday.

The extensive *Religious Landscape Study* (RLS) study found the number of people in the U.S. who identify as Christian has been stable since 2019 and that the number of those who are unaffiliated with a religion, after years of growing in number, has leveled off.

Other results from the poll include the following:

62% of Americans identified as Christians (40% were Protestant, 19% Catholic, and 3% identified as another Christian group).

The share of Americans who identify as Christians has been between 60% to 64% from 2019 to 2024, compared to 78% in 2007.

Religiously unaffiliated adults (atheists, agnostics, or "nothing in



particular") make up 29% of the population in the latest RLS, a number that has plateaued in recent years after a long period of sustained growth.

A total of some 7% of the U.S. population is non-Christian but religious — including 1.7% Jewish, 1.2% Muslim, 1.1% Buddhist, and 0.9% Hindu.

Researchers of the study wrote that "the long-term decline in the Christian share of the population and growth of religious 'nones' is demographically broad-based. There are fewer Christians and more 'nones' among men and women; people in every racial and ethnic category; college graduates and those with less education; and residents of all major regions of the country."

Researchers also noted that 37% of self-described liberals identified with Christianity, a 25 percentage point drop from 2007 when it was 62%. Meanwhile, 51% of liberals said they have no religion, a 24 percentage point jump from 27% in 2007.

The survey was carried out from July 17, 2023, to March 4, 2024, among 36,908 respondents. The margin of error was 0.8 percentage points.
